


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

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WELCOME TO THE FESTIVAL!



Welcome to the 2019 Connecting Chords Music Festival! "Connecting Chords" describes the Michigan Festival of Sacred Music programming and philosophy: we take a broad view of the word "sacred," presenting events that not only represent diverse faiths, but transcend traditions and bring us together by highlighting things considered sacred by most people: human dignity, the environment, cultural traditions, and freedom of expression. The 2019

Festival also includes drumming and sound immersion, showing some ways music and sound can be used therapeutically and in group participation.

This year's Festival features 17 events (8 of which are free) with many additional educational outreach events, including visits by our artists to classes at the Kalamazoo Juvenile Home. We continue our \$5 ticket price for those 25 years old and under, and we are experimenting with a "pay-what-you-can" option on some programs to increase accessibility. Our schedule covers approximately six weeks, making an effort to avoid conflicts with other arts organizations while giving audiences time to reflect on the programs they attend.

Many wonderful artists – some new to us and some returning favorites, some local and some from farther afield – will present a wide variety of exciting, uplifting and thought-provoking programs. We will collaborate with new and old friends in presenting these artists, and we continue to appreciate the close sense of community which makes Kalamazoo so special.

This year we dedicate the Festival to **Carol Baker**, a board member since 2017, who left us far too soon in January. We especially dedicate the visit of the Tibetan Monks to her memory. They are building their sand mandala at the Kalamazoo Valley Museum, another organization with which Carol was actively involved.

Though we dedicate the Festival to Carol's memory, I also dedicate my personal efforts to the memory of my mother, **Clarice W. Start**, who passed away on October 1. She was a staunch supporter of the MFSM, an active volunteer, and, of course, a longtime supporter of me and anything good with which I might be involved. We dedicate the *Pas de Deux* concert to her memory; it features soprano and organ, both especially dear to her.

Please join us as we all experience the transformational power of music, exploring our rich cultural fabric while appreciating how it can all fit together into a larger harmony.

We dedicate this Festival to the memory of **Carol Baker** (12/27/1947 – 1/29/2019), who left us far too soon. Anyone who knew Carol knew her positive energy and great enthusiasm. She didn't just attend concerts – she fully experienced them and avidly discussed them, increasing the appreciation of those events for all. This enthusiasm, inquiry, and active involvement was characteristic of her many other passions as well.

For the Michigan Festival of Sacred Music, she was an energetic and organizing force, always ready to jump in as a working board member to take on a variety of tasks with gusto. She was instrumental in the brainstorming that came up with our "Connecting Chords" name, initially sketching out C-community, H-harmony, O-outreach, R-resonance, D-diversity, S-sacred.

It is through Carol that we became aware of sound therapy in the Kalamazoo area, and the Sound Immersion program presented by Judy Huxmann during our Festival is a direct result of this. Carol was also instrumental in our engaging the Parkwood-Upjohn Drum Choir for our February 2019 Sound & Spirit program.


Carol earned her doctorate at Virginia Tech, eventually moving to Kalamazoo to work at Upjohn. After a successful career in microbial physiology, Carol retired in 2013. She loved her garden along with tai chi and yoga. She and her husband were strong supporters of many arts organizations beyond the MFSM, including the Kalamazoo Symphony, Fontana, and WMU School of Music.

Carol enjoyed giving back to her community, and she sat on the boards of the Kalamazoo Valley Museum and Michigan Yoga Association, in addition to the MFSM. She also helped run GISMO at the Kalamazoo Area Math & Science Center, helping empower girls with interests in science and math.

Carol is much appreciated and sorely missed. We dedicate this Festival, and especially the appearance of the Tibetan Monks, which she was particularly enthusiastic about, to her memory.

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



Iraqi oud master with Iranian tar virtuosa

Iraqi *oud* master **Rahim AlHaj** and Iranian *tar* virtuosa **Sahba Motallebi** – two masters of ancient stringed instruments – perform together in this extraordinary event.

ABOUT RAHIM ALHAJ

"One of the top *oud* players in the world" (*San Francisco Chronicle*), Rahim was born in Baghdad, Iraq. He began playing the *oud* – the grandfather of all stringed instruments – in his second-grade classroom at age nine. He exhibited such an astonishing affinity for the *oud* that his teacher was moved to give him the instrument. The *oud* quickly became Rahim's closest confidant and constant companion, sharing every waking and sleeping hour.



In his nearly forty-year career, he has won many awards and accolades, including two Grammy nominations in 2008 and 2010.

In 1991, Rahim was forced to leave Iraq due to his activism against the Saddam Hussein regime. He moved to the United States in 2000 as a political refugee, and he has resided in Albuquerque, New Mexico, ever since. In 2015, Rahim was awarded the National Endowment for the Arts National Heritage Fellowship, the highest honor for traditional arts in the United States.

ABOUT SAHBA MOTALLEBI

Sahba Motallebi is a virtuosa on both the *tar* and *setar*, two related lutes at the heart of Persian classical music.

As a teenager in her native Iran, she pushed against patrimonial restrictions and emerged as a dynamo on her instruments; when she was only fourteen, she began her studies at the Tehran Conservatory of Music, and between the years 1995 and 1998, she was a four-time winner as best *tar* player at the Iranian Music Festival. She also studied abroad in Russia and Turkey.

In 1999 she was invited to join the prestigious Iranian National Orchestra, which initiated her global performance career. Her performances as a soloist and in collaboration with renowned vocalists such as Mohammad Reza Shajarian, Alireza Ghorbani, Mamak Khadem and esteemed composers such as Hossein Alizadeh, Arshad Tahmasebi, and Yo-Yo Ma have touched audiences around the globe.



For the past decade, Sahba has lived near Los Angeles and continues to perform worldwide. She is also recognized as an innovator in the teaching of Persian music; her pioneering efforts to put instructional materials online reflect her abiding commitment to bring the gift of music to her community and the world.

In addition to providing this concert, Rahim and Sahba will be conducting an outreach event at the Kalamazoo County Juvenile Home on October 18.

ABOUT THE MUSICIANS

Having performed all over the world, organist **Rhonda Sider Edgington** has a diverse repertoire with a wide range of musical interests. Currently based in Holland, Michigan, Rhonda is the organist at Hope Church; a staff accompanist at Hope College; Seminary Organist at Western Theological Seminary; and dean of the Holland chapter of the Michigan Guild of Organists.

Born in Nagoya, Japan, **Ken Koshio** is a Taiko drummer, folk singer, and songwriter currently based in Phoenix, Arizona. (For more about Ken, please see the Parchment Community Library event on page 23.)

Esther Vandecar studied Taiko in Japan while living there for over seven years, mentoring with Kodo, Daihachi Oguchi (the father of modern Taiko), and Munakata Sensei in the Hiroshima Preservation Society. She was the long-time director of Fushicho Daiko, Arizona's longest-running public Taiko dojo.

Carolyn Koebel has been exploring rhythm and vibration for the past thirty years. She divides her time between hospice music therapy, teaching, and accompanying at Western Michigan University, Kalamazoo College, and universities around the country, as well as touring regionally and internationally with a variety of ensembles.

Mark Lopez is a performer, arranger, and educator in West Michigan. He is the Frontline Coordinator for the Legends Drum and Bugle Corps in Kalamazoo, and he also teaches at the Hope College Department of Dance.

The mission of **Michigan Hiryu Daiko** drummers is to educate and entertain children and adults by introducing them to the 2000-year-old Japanese art form. The organization was founded by Esther Vandecar; she partnered with Carolyn Koebel in 2011 to form a Kalamazoo team (now the longest running Taiko group in Michigan).

Songs in Hebrew, Arabic, and the uniquely Sephardic language of Ladino will all be featured. Though the songs come from long ago and far away, their themes of finding your place in love, family, and the world remain timeless.

Leahaliza has performed at Carnegie Hall, the New York Jewish Music Festival, Wayne State University Cohn-Haddow Center for Judaic Studies, Frankel Institute for Advanced Judaic Studies at the University of Michigan, and the Michigan Festival of Sacred Music in 2016.

Born in Nagoya, Japan, **Ken Koshio** moved to the United States in 1998, and he is currently based in Phoenix, Arizona. A folk rock musician, Ken was inspired to create the Thousand Cranes Tour after the September 11, 2001 tragedy – culminating in a concert at Ground Zero marking the one-year anniversary. He brought with him 10,000 origami cranes that people folded on the road from Los Angeles to New York – symbolic of prayers for a better, more peaceful world!

In 2004, Ken found his love of Taiko drumming. He is the first person outside of Japan to receive a certified teaching license of *Hiroshima Jidaiko* (indigenous Taiko drum) from the Hiroshima Preservation Society.

Ken will be appearing at multiple 2019 Festival events, including Fujin Raijin: Music of Japan and the Taiko Drumming Master Class.

Much like the movie experience of the 1920's, this viewing of the classic 1928 silent film *The Passion of Joan of Arc* will be accompanied by live music. Composer **George Sarah** will perform his original score with area musicians, including singers from **Early Music Michigan**.

The Passion of Joan of Arc is widely regarded as a landmark of cinema, praised and referenced by many film directors and musicians. Film critic Pauline Kael wrote that Renée Jeanne Falconetti's portrayal of Joan of Arc "may be the finest performance ever recorded on film."

Dozens of unique interpretations for the film's music have been imagined since its release. In fact, the movie premieres in Copenhagen and Paris used different versions of the score! George Sarah debuted his version at a screening in Los Angeles in 2010.

ABOUT THE MUSICIANS



George Sarah

Electronic composer and multi-instrumentalist George Sarah has been a mainstay on the Los Angeles music scene since 1985. With numerous albums and live performances to his name, George Sarah has also has written scores for dozens of films and TV shows, including CSI, History Detectives, The Oprah Winfrey Show, and Buffy the Vampire Slayer.

Founded in 1996, Early Music Michigan is a vocal ensemble emphasizing music written before the 19th century. They perform in a dynamic, varied and historically informed manner that honors these rare and ancient musical treasures, the artistic voice, and the humanity of collaborative music-making.



Representing Early Music Michigan in this performance are **Ann Marie Boyle**, soprano; **Sara Miller Schulte**, alto; **Eric Strand**, countertenor; and **Justin Budzynski**, tenor.

A string quartet will join the other musicians: **Lisa A. Williams**, violin; **Nora Frisk**, viola; **Igor Cetkovic**, cello; and **Elizabeth Start**, cello.


Visiting organist **David Lauer** will perform an afternoon program on the First Baptist Church's Létourneau organ.

Hailed by *The Times of India* as a "musical ambassador" and "pride of India," Kalamazoo-native, educator, and percussionist **Rohan Krishnamurthy** imagines new musical intersections to bridge diverse communities and cultures. His cross-genre artistry draws from a formal study of Indian classical Carnatic music, propagating the ancient tradition and expanding it across global genres.

Rohan will be joined by **Raaginder**, an Indian classical violinist, singer, and music producer who has performed in prominent venues all over the world, including the White House, Staples Center, and Wembley Arena. Classically trained in Hindustani music, Raaginder experiments with different genres of music – including hip-hop and Bhangra – to create his own unique sound.

Blending the two classical Indian traditions with Hindu and Sikh chants, these two highly-acclaimed musicians will deliver a captivating experience for audiences.

He performed frequently to enthusiastic audiences throughout Uganda until 1982, when he was forced to flee to Kenya as a political refugee.

Immigrating to the United States in 1987, Samite and his wife Sandra now make their home in Ithaca, New York. His smooth vocals accompanied by the kalimba, marimba, and various flutes mesmerize audiences worldwide.

In 2002, Samite founded Musicians for World Harmony, an organization dedicated to enabling musicians throughout the world to share their music to promote peace, understanding, and harmony among peoples. He travels to sing, play music, and exchange stories with victims of war, poverty, and HIV. He has traveled extensively to war-torn countries in Africa to work in refugee camps, with former child soldiers, and AIDS orphans.


